# Welcome

In January 2025, we announced some exciting news: the formation of the **Lund Humphries**Foundation for Visual Arts (a Charitable Incorporated Organisation, or CIO), which has a broad charitable mission to advance education in the visual arts. As a Foundation, we will continue to publish specialist books on the visual arts which align with our educational charitable purpose, and new Lund Humphries book projects will be contracted by the Foundation. You can find more information about the new CIO on our website, including our longer-term ambitions for grant-giving projects.

We are of course already publishing books which further understanding and appreciation of the visual arts, as demonstrated by this catalogue. This season's programme is particularly strong in the areas of Architecture and Design. John Vanbrugh: The Drama of Architecture draws on Charles Saumarez Smith's close study of Vanbrugh's letters to create a rich picture of the ideas, social milieu and professional practice of the celebrated architect-playwright. We are delighted to be publishing the book in association with Sir John Soane's Museum ahead of an exhibition opening there in 2026, the tercentenary year of Vanbrugh's death.

2026 also marks the 175th anniversary of the Great Exhibition of 1851, the first World's Fair, which was conceived by Prince Albert as a way of improving the quality of art and design in Britain, and which led to the formation of the V&A. Julius Bryant's new book **The Great Exhibition in Art** tells the story of the landmark Exhibition through the art which was produced to record and accompany it, bringing to life the experience of the 19th-century visitor.

British Interior Design since 1925 picks up the story of design in Britain some 70 years after the Great Exhibition, tracing the history of the discipline of interior design from its inception in the aftermath of the First World War to the early 21st century. In The Modern British City 1945–2000, a multi-authored, interdisciplinary reference book, the starting-point is the Second World War and the transformation of British cities in the aftermath of destruction and beyond. Enduring through war is London's river: Andrew Saint's Waterloo Bridge and London River tells the story of one iconic London bridge, its relationship to the river, and its role in both the working life of the city and the cultural imagination.

Read on for more art-book news, including new monographs on painters **Maria Sibylla Merian**, **Josefa de Óbidos**, **David Remfry** and **Caroline Walker**, and the next volume in our Architectural Photographers series, devoted to the work of **Richard Bryant**.



Sir John Vanbrugh was one of Britain's greatest architects and the designer of some of the most important and best beloved English country houses, including Castle Howard and Blenheim Palace. This beautifully illustrated biography draws on Vanbrugh's letters to bring to life his ideas, beliefs, and buildings, as well as providing insight into his professional practice and working relationships. It paints a fascinating portrait of this worldly figure, friend and ally of the great, playwright and theatre manager. Charles Saumarez Smith examines the highly imaginative and emotional qualities of Vanbrugh's architecture, especially compared to the work of his contemporaries Wren and Hawksmoor, and reveals his influence on later architects, from Robert Adam to Robert Venturi and Denise Scott Brown.

Charles Saumarez Smith is a writer, curator and art historian. He has served as Director of the National Portrait Gallery, London, and the National Gallery, London, and as Chief Executive of the Royal Academy of Arts. London.



# The Great Exhibition in Art

Picturing the First World's Fair, 1851

Julius Bryant

The Great Exhibition of 1851 is generally thought of as a giant trade fair, a showcase for empire and industry. But it was also conceived to solve a deep-rooted problem with the poor quality of British art and design. This book, a prequel to Julius Bryant's trilogy of volumes on the V&A's 19th-century collections, establishes the centrality of works of fine art amongst the objects on show at the Great Exhibition.

Drawing for the first time on the vast visual resources of the National Art Library's Great Exhibition collection, including definitive official publications, commercial guides, souvenirs and satirical periodicals, it also provides a rich anthology of period images which convey the 19th-century visitor's experience of the first World's Fair.

Julius Bryant is Keeper Emeritus of the Victoria and Albert Museum and author of *Designing the V&A* (2017), *Creating the V&A* (2019) and *Enriching the V&A* (2022).

# Investigations and Reflections

#### **Andrew Saint**

As a subject, Waterloo Bridge fascinated the likes of Dickens, Constable, Monet and Derain. It was also notorious as a site for suicides. This book tells the story of a bridge's place in the city - its history in use, its inextricable connection with the great river which it crosses, and the character and activities of the two shores which it joins together. While focusing on Waterloo Bridge, the book also explores the evolution of the surrounding districts and the character of the Thames as it flows through Central London: tidal, wide, difficult to navigate and bridge, and intensely busy during its heyday. It sets Waterloo Bridge alongside the other London river bridges, revealing the complex politics and economics of bridge building.

Andrew Saint is Professor of Architectural History at the Bartlett School of Architecture, UCL. He was the General Editor of The Survey of London and author of London 1870-1914: A City at its Zenith (Lund Humphries 2021).

# The Modern British City 1945-2000



Bringing together architectural, urban and social historians, this book charts the extraordinary changes that took place in British cities between the end of the Second World War and the early 21st century, revealing how many cities which had been in a parlous state underwent a renaissance, while others contended with de-industrialisation and conflict. Paying homage to Dyos and Wolff's *The Victorian City*, topics tackled range from gentrification and multiculturalism to shopping and nightlife. This ambitious volume provides a valuable understanding of these multiple historical processes as they played out in different urban places.

Simon Gunn is Emeritus Professor of Urban History at the University of Leicester. Peter Mandler is Professor of Modern Cultural History at the University of Cambridge and Bailey Lecturer in History at Gonville and Caius College, Cambridge. Otto Saumarez Smith is Lecturer in Architectural History at the University of Warwick.

# **British Interior Design** since 1925

A Critical History

Bruce Peter and Drew Plunkett

This is the first critical history of interior design in Britain, a profession which emerged after the First World War. It examines both interior design (principally commercial projects) and interior decoration (principally domestic projects), setting them within the social, cultural, economic and political contexts which shaped creative imaginations.

Compared to 20th-century architecture, interior design and decoration were more responsive to the nuances and rapid changes of popular taste. The book describes and illustrates Art Deco hotels, modernist interiors of the 1950s, retail work in the 1980s, and clubs and restaurants in the 1990s, concluding with 21st-century offices and domestic interiors.

Bruce Peter is the Professor of Design History in the Glasgow School of Art's School of Design. Drew Plunkett is a writer and former academic who was Head of Interior Design at Glasgow School of Art.

# **Architecture in Conversion** and the Work of Carlo Scarpa

Federica Goffi, with photographs by Prakash Patel

The work of architect Carlo Scarpa (1906-1978) is in between: neither architecture nor conservation, but architecture in conversion. This book discusses this approach, revealing it to be radically different from current conservation practices, and to entail more than a change of use. The significance of time, weather and tempo within Scarpa's work is revealed through a close analysis of his drawings and details from key buildings and their histories of multiple authorship. In fact, the book highlights drawing as central to Scarpa's practice. Based on discussions with many of his partners, it explores Scarpa's collaborative approach, the importance of all senses and the notion of 'unfinished architecture'. It concludes by examining various contemporary architects' projects which follow Scarpa's approach.

Federica Goffi is a Professor of Architecture at the ASAU Carleton University and a licensed architect in Italy. Prakash Patel is an American architectural photographer and architect.

# **The Complete Works** of Rick Mather

Kester Rattenbury

This is the first comprehensive overview of the work of Rick Mather (1937-2013), one of the leading architects of his generation, whose innovative and experimental contributions to environmental, adaptive, socially structured and technically advanced architecture remain largely unseen beneath the surface of his stylish spaces. Drawing on Mather's own archives and remaining built works, and on conversations with colleagues and friends, the book uncovers how his best-known works - the glamorous houses, stylish restaurants and major adaptations of historical museums interwove with fascinating lesser-known projects to push the boundaries of architectural practice. He conjured 'new' spaces from unlikely settings; showcased major adaptive design in the age of new-build; pioneered emerging environmentalism; and prototyped radical glass technologies and high-density use. Always structuring social experience and circulation in relation to programme, landscapes and cities, he showed just how much more you can do with less.




Richard Bryant began his career as a photographer in the 1970s after studying architecture and quickly became one of the architectural press's most sought-after photographers. Following a shift from black-and-white to colour, his work went on to define the image of 1990s architecture, with precise, clean compositions, a richness of tone and a subtlety of lighting. This book reveals his collaborations with architectural greats including Tadao Ando, Geoffrey Bawa, Frank Gehry, Zaha Hadid, Richard Meier, James Stirling, Norman Foster and Richard Rogers. It discusses his iconic images of Scarpa's architecture, London, and the Sir John Soane's Museum, examines his career and interests, sets his work within broader architectural and photographic contexts, and provides insights into his methods and approaches.

Martin Caiger-Smith was until 2024 Head of the MA Curating the Art Museum at the Courtauld and previously worked at the Photographers' Gallery and the Hayward Gallery.





# Maria Sibylla Merian

### Catherine Powell-Warren

In her time, Maria Sibylla Merian (1647–1717) was lauded as a painter who had perfected the art of the miniature and of flower painting. However, in recent decades it is her scientific contributions that have garnered the most attention. This book re-focuses attention on her artistic achievements and assists the reader in understanding Merian's life as a woman and as an artist in the early modern Dutch Republic.

Using Merian's hundreds of extant watercolours and book illustrations as sources, in combination with her surviving correspondence and with contemporary art treatises, Catherine Powell-Warren recognises Maria Sibylla Merian's artistic contributions and situates them in their sociocultural and creative context. The book reveals its subject's achievements as an artist, as well as in other realms, to be noteworthy and perhaps even extraordinary.

Catherine Powell-Warren is an assistant professor of art history at KU Leuven. She completed a post-doctoral research fellowship at Ghent University, focusing on the role of women in the early modern arts of the Low Countries.

# Josefa de Óbidos

This book provides a long-overdue introduction to the life and work of Portuguese painter Josefa de Ayala, known as Josefa de Óbidos (1630-1684). Her paintings encompass a diversity of religious and secular subjects in a variety of formats, from portraits to still lifes; from small oils on copper to large church altarpieces; and from gentle depictions of the Virgin Mary and female saints to gruesome portrayals of the Passion of Christ. Her oeuvre also includes engravings.


This timely study situates the artist within the Iberian and broader European artistic milieux of her time, the careers and experiences of other early modern women artists, and the material culture of Portugal's global territories, bringing its subject's artistic achievement and transnational character to light.


This book emphasises Lady Charlotte Schreiber (1812–1895) — also known as Lady Charlotte Guest, *née* Bertie — as one of the most significant women in the history of collecting. An extraordinary collector, historian and philanthropist, Charlotte subverted gendered norms and challenged Victorian conventions. This new study establishes Charlotte's contribution to ceramic history and cultural education, and demonstrates her influential role in transnational artistic networks.

Charting Charlotte's eventful life, McCaffrey-Howarth focuses on her identity as a renowned connoisseur, whose donation of thousands of objects to the Victoria & Albert Museum and the British Museum marked a pioneering move for a female benefactor. Lady Charlotte Schreiber, Extraordinary Art Collector presents unique insight into the social and cultural world of Victorian England and the role of women within this.

The Life and Work of Sir Lawrence Weaver



Lawrence Weaver is remembered as a critic, journalist and champion of country-house architects, including Edwin Lutyens and Robert Lorimer. This book offers a portrait of a remarkably able and charismatic man. It traces Weaver's journey from travelling salesman to architectural editor of Country Life, where he championed the Arts & Crafts and historic buildings. Weaver then took on leading roles in the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries, the Design and Industries Association, Ashtead Potteries, the Rural Industries Bureau, and the British Empire Exhibition. In all these activities, the Arts & Craft principles - fitness of design for purpose and fine craftsmanship - defined his outlook. Timothy Brittain-Catlin concludes by setting Weaver within the broader context of architectural criticism.

Lawrence Trevelyan Weaver is a retired professor of child health whose interests and publications have turned to history and biography. Timothy Brittain-Catlin is Professor of Architectural History at the University of Cambridge and author of The Edwardians and their Houses (Lund Humphries, 2020).
